
MISSIONARY MATERIAL FROM TRINITY COLLEGE LIBRARY HELD IN THE ARCHIVES AT SPECIAL COLLECTIONS, UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW LIBRARY:

A SCOPING REPORT







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This report was commissioned by Trinity College to consider the nature and extent of the records within Glasgow University library which relate to foreign missions, for the most part deriving from the former Trinity College Library, and to report on their potential for further development. My thanks to Rev. Dr Doug Gay, Principal of Trinity College, for commissioning the report whilst I was working in Theology and Religious Studies at the University of Glasgow.

The report focuses on the richest and most distinctive of the missionary materials under sections 2 and 3 below, being the records of Student Missionary Societies and Uncatalogued Bound Pamphlets from the former Trinity College Library. The report is divided into four sections.

1. INTRODUCTION

The early history of the Glasgow Free Church College, which became 'Trinity College' in 1930 after the reunion of the Church of Scotland and the United Free Church in 1929, is considered within the initial chapters of the centenary volume by Stewart Mechie, *Trinity College 1856-1956*, (Collins, 1956).¹ In the autumn of 1843, New College, Edinburgh began classes as the first Free Church College after the Disruption, the present building being completed in 1846. For the following five years, a 'war of pamphlets' broke out within the Free Church as to whether a single national College should be maintained, or two further Colleges be instituted in Aberdeen and Glasgow. One such pamphlet was identified below in the sample bound volumes from the Trinity College Library. The main protagonists on either side were principal figures in the Disruption, William Cunningham (New College from 1845) and Robert Smith Candlish, the father of James Candlish (later of Trinity College).

The Free Church Assembly in 1851 passed a resolution in principle in favour of 'College Extension'. In 1855, a group of fourteen West of Scotland businessmen presented a Memorial to the Assembly offering to build a College in Glasgow and to endow it, led by Dr William Clark of Wester Moffat.

Their offer being accepted, and the land identified on what is now Park Circus, the foundations were laid for the College on 18th August 1856 and the College began on 4th November 1856 with the induction of the first professors – Patrick Fairbairn (Principal 1857-74) (New Testament) and James Gibson (Church History) (James McCosh, later President of Princeton, declining). Gibson was soon to be embroiled in a dispute with his students, resulting in him bringing case of heresy against them to the General Assembly of 1859 which was dismissed! George Douglas (Old Testament) and William Hetherington (Systematic Theology) soon followed. The Chair of Practical Theology was instituted in 1900.

Prominent 19th and early 20th Century Professors at the time of the records below included: Chair of New Testament A.B. Bruce (1875-99) and James Denney (1900-

17); Chair of Systematic Theology James Candlish (1872-97) and James Denney (1897-1900), also Principal 1915-17; Chair of Evangelistic Theology (based at New College, but lecturing at all three Colleges) Alexander Duff 1860-78.² All of these figures appear in the minutes of the Free Church Missionary Society as noted below.

The Trinity College Library was considerably enhanced, including in its Pamphlet Collection, by unions prior to 1929: firstly, of the majority of the Reformed Presbyterian Church with the Free Church in 1876, with records dating back to 1680 coming to Trinity College Library from New College in 1929; and, secondly, the union of the United Presbyterian Church (formed 1847) with the Free Church in 1900 to form the United Free Church. According to Mechie, 'many thousands of books came to the Library that great day, for the UP Synod Library was one of the finest theological libraries in the country'.³ Some particularly valuable records and volumes that now should be in Glasgow University Library are set out by Mechie within the text at pp 70-75.

The key records considered are of the Glasgow Free Church Students' Missionary Society from 1857 to 1900 (Ms Gen 1702) and of the Glasgow University Missionary Society (Ms Gen 1434).

The Glasgow Free Church Students' Missionary Society was founded in November 1857. Mechie notes the work of the College in local mission, which is readily apparent in the minutes of the Society – from Cranstonhill Church in 1876, to Cowcaddens Church in 1883, to a lengthy involvement in a mission station in the Broomielaw from 1885 onwards to the 1920s.⁴ Up the Union of 1929, the Missionary Society moved its activities to Lancefield Church and later St Marks. Mechie remarks that as of 1956, and indeed increasingly from 1929 onwards, the Missionary Society could no longer carry out that work in Home Mission, and instead the students were assigned Assistantships by a Board of Practical Training advised by the Professor of Practical Theology.⁵

The students devoted a considerable amount of time to Home Mission via the Student Missionary Society. For example, in 1898, of 78 regular students, 43 were in charge of missions, with three or four acting as assistants to ministers; this would involve preaching, Bible Class, Prayer Meetings and visiting. This is in addition to the annual 'pleading', a circuit of preaching in churches seeking donations for the foreign mission schemes which the Society had agreed to support for that year. Much of this work amongst students becomes apparent in the Society's minutes below.

As for foreign missions, as well as visits and talks by leading figures, the records of the student missionary societies reveal considerable sums of money were raised to support key missions in Scottish mission history, such as Alexander Duff in Calcutta, John Wilson in Bombay, the Livingstonia scheme in modern Malawi and at Pietermaritzburg and Lovedale in modern South Africa.

By the formation of the United Free Church in 1900, the scale of foreign missionary endeavour in the newly formed UFC was staggering. As of 1900, they had 153 mission stations with congregation, and 6,723 out-stations, in 15 foreign mission fields; with 292 European missionaries in the field, 110 of them ordained, and 2,363 native pastors, evangelists and teachers. The total income raised to support this effort in 1900 was around £195,000, which is about £24 million as of 2020.⁶

The Glasgow University Missionary Society (Ms Gen 1434) was founded in 1821, in the same period as Aberdeen (1820), St Andrews (1824) and Edinburgh (1825). The Church of Scotland began the active support of foreign missions in 1824, and Alexander Duff was its first foreign missionary to Calcutta in 1830. All foreign missionaries of the Church of Scotland, bar one, transferred to the Free Church in 1843. The remainder of the 19th Century saw a gradual resuscitation of the missionary efforts of the Established Church.

Of particular interest is the involvement in the late 19th Century of the Glasgow University Missionary Association, as part of the Scottish Universities Mission, to found the missionary enterprise in Kalimpong, North India. In Kalimpong, the schools which were set up, and Dr John Anderson Graham's famous childrens' homes, still operate

as of 2020, as does the church built in memorial of the Universities' first missionary there, William MacFarlane. MacFarlane was the first missionary in the area, and modern Kalimpong was effectively founded by the Universities' Mission. The weblinks included in the notes to the records will direct the reader to the continuing resonance of those missionary enterprises.

The work of the Student Missionary Associations in the mid to late 19th Century and early 20th Century is set in the context of the global missionary movement and, in particular, the Scottish contribution to that movement. What are the outlines of those features (many of which can be identified in the records)? There are three key articles for the reader to consider in order to set the records in the Glasgow University Library in historical context (an expanded bibliography is below):

Very briefly, the key points made in each in relation to the common traits of the Scottish missionary enterprise are:

(a) Stanley (2019) – two preliminary observations: 'the Scottish contribution to the British Protestant overseas missionary enterprise was a disproportionately large one' (51); and many Scottish missionaries were not sent by the Scottish Presbyterian Churches but by missionary societies.

With those observations, Stanley offers 'five broad generalizations' as characteristics of the Scottish missionary endeavour: (a) the ongoing tension between Church missions and those of mission agencies; (b) the issue of whether the theology of the Scottish missionaries ought to bear 'the distinctive stamp of Calvin's desire to see the entire life of Christian communities –

including their political and economic affairs – brought under the theocratic rule of Christ' (56) – Stanley suggests that Scots were much more likely to do so than English counterparts; (c) a strong insistence on education as being integral to the transformation of individuals and communities; (d) many Scottish missionaries drew deeply from the legacy of the Scottish enlightenment, seeking to 'propel pre-industrial societies along the road to social and economic improvement' (59), in which one might include the role of medical missionaries; and (e) that the distinctiveness of the Scottish missionary enterprise weakened by the early 20th Century.

(b) Walls (1993) – Walls offers, firstly, a very helpful outline of the origins of the foreign missions from Scotland at pages 567 to 571. He focuses upon key developments such as the confluence in the 18th Century of the streams of mission from the Scottish Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge and evangelical awakenings; the early societies such as the Glasgow Missionary Society and Edinburgh Missionary Society (both 1796), the latter becoming the Scottish Missionary Society in 1819 – both sent missionaries to the field particularly in Sierra Leone and Jamaica, then in Bombay and 'Kaffiria'; the influence of periodicals and local missionary societies; and the eventual agreement in 1824 of the Church of Scotland to sponsor foreign missions (the first overture being in 1796).

Walls further carries out an extensive survey of Scottish missionary enterprises across the globe at pages 574 to 594. Between those sections, he writes on mission theory, focusing on the centrality on mission by education: 'a providential view of corporate intellectual development under the influence of consistent Christian teaching relating to every aspect of life and learning' (572).

Walls concludes, despite the vast scale of engagement abroad, that amongst the Scottish churches '...while the Scottish perception of missions has sometimes...been a high one, it is hard to escape the conclusion that the missionary project, whether forwarded by the abundance of the rich or the tithes of the poor, was always a peripheral one, always of the edge of the home church's vision, always the direct concern of the few.' (573) (c) Ross (2014) – asking the question, 'what were the characteristics which distinguished the Scottish missionary movement?', Ross highlights six features, partly based on a book by Professor David Cairns from 1911. They are: (a) social vision; (b) ecclesial commitment; (c) intellectual quality; (d) extensive engagement; (d) taking the long view; and (e) national identity and social outlook.

As for future development of work with the records, as below I would recommend that funding is found to fully explore and archive the Unbounded Pamphlets of Trinity College that are already identified, around 80 in number, as well as to investigate the whereabouts of the remainder. On consideration of a cross section, there is much valuable material within them.

Furthermore, the records and pamphlets could be advertised as of interest to the following scholars:

- The history of Scottish foreign missions in particular a potential research project on (a) the Scottish Universities Missionary Associations, both individually and collectively; (b) the platform to write more fully on the foundation of Kalimpong and the schools and homes still in operation; or (c) the history and legacy of the Missionary Associations of the former Free Church Colleges, of which the New College Mission Society is now the only survivor – see <u>https://www.newcollegemissions.co.uk/</u>
- The history and dynamism of the early Free Church, a considerable body of material in the pamphlets being related to the Disruption, and on the home and foreign missions of the Free Church in that period
- Passing interest in relation to the Christian history of the host countries of the missionaries – particularly India, but also Malawi, South Africa, China, New Zealand, North America and the Pacific
- The specific histories of the medical missionaries whose individual records are set out in Part 4.

2. <u>RECORDS OF THE FREE CHURCH, UNITED</u> <u>PRESBYTERIAN, UNITED FREE CHURCH AND</u> <u>GLASGOW UNIVERSITY STUDENT MISSIONARY</u> <u>SOCIETIES</u>

I am indebted for the outline of the relevant records below, and for the list of books and records of missionaries set out in section 4, to the investigations in 2015 of the then Deputy Director of Glasgow University Library & University Archivist, Lesley Richmond.

Key topics that the records illuminate include:

- (a) The work of the student missionary societies of the Free Churches, the Established Church and the University, both in home and foreign missions;
- (b) In home mission, student involvement in mission stations in Glasgow, and the system of 'pleading at home' by taking Sunday services in parish churches to raise awareness and money for specified foreign missionary projects, often in India;
- (c) The involvement of many key figures in the global missionary movement in addressing the Societies, particularly Alexander Duff and John Wilson, and the involvement with the Society of key Church figures of the mid to late 19th Century as students and/or as Professors e.g. James Candlish, A.B. Bruce, and Dugald Mackichan;
- (d) Insights into the development of nascent foreign missions;
- (e) The setting up via the University Mission Society of the joint Universities mission to Kalimpong, North India: which resulted in schools which are still in existence, and provided the platform for the celebrated work in the childrens' homes of Dr John Anderson Graham, also continuing; and

(f) An insight into the early dynamism of the Free Church after the Disruption.

NOTES – SIGNIFICANT MATTERS ONLY (KEY PASSAGES EMBOLDENED)

Handwritten Minutes:

Free Church College instituted May 1856. Profs – Principal Fairbairn, Profs Gibson (Theology & Church History), Douglas (Hebrew) and Hetherington (Apologetics)

Inside cover - list of office bearers 1857 -1867

First met 28/11/57 within the schoolroom connected with Free St George's Church – Hon. President Hetherington, President Mr Alexander Fullerton

"... it should occupy some field for home missionary operations where the students who were willing might work alone and without interfering with any already established missionary operations." (intending Glasgow)

December – will be in the Calton (Free St James)

Association meets fortnightly.

Jan 1858 – services at mission station in Bell Street, deputation to students of United Presbyterian Church

Feb 1858 – office bearers become trustees of the Calton Mission, liaising with the Bell Street Mission Committee

13 Feb 1858 - Liaising with Glasgow University Mission Association – for social gathering – – would be 'fitted to compromise their principles and their consistency in the eyes of the world'. Carried on basis that 'we thereby compromise none of our distinctive principles as the Free Church of Scotland' – 21 to 12, with a protest from those opposing, each to decide whether to go on own conscience

27 Feb 1858 – paper read on Bengal as a field of mission

Liaising with the 'Assembly's Glasgow Evangelisation Committee'.

4 Dec 1858 – given the growth of the college and the number of students, motion carried that 'it has become necessary to widen the influence' of the Association, as 'it is of the utmost importance that all of the Free Church Students whether Theological or Literary be induced to join... (for) acquiring and diffusing a missionary spirit', 'for the evangelisation of the heathen both at home and abroad'. Structural moves to do so.

(PRINTED) 'Laws as again amended' from meeting of 18/3/60, 'Laws of the Glasgow Free Church Students' Missionary Society', including:

- All students in Glasgow who are Free Church, or any other holding Westminster standards, 'especially the doctrine of the sole headship of the Lord Jesus Christ over His Church', can join
- "III. The Society's object shall be to cultivate a Missionary spirit among the Students, and to help in disseminating Gospel truth, both at home and abroad.'

19/11/59 – the resignation of the 'Society's missionary' to Calton Mission, Mr Craig, seeking a successor (and subsequent minutes); gives indication of types of subjects being taught, reps from each year e.g. natural philosophy, moral philosophy, logic

UPs propose a joint service of UP, Established and Free – Frees refuse. UP Missionary Society does visit Feb 1860.

Find a new missionary early 1860 (James Johnman), liaising with some leading lights e.g. writing to Dr Guthrie to preach the annual sermon of the society who refuses due to ill health, then writing to Dr Bruce

(Good insight into workings of Free Church at that stage in some of the minutes)

10/3/60 - addressed by FC missionary in Calcutta, Rev. J. Gardiner.

Nov 1860 – arrangements being made 'as to districts in the Calton to be occupied by Students'

15/12/60 – **Rev Behari Lal Singh addressed the meeting on missions in India** (*a fascinating character who Andrew Walls has written about in Becker & Stanley eds, Europe as the Other (2013); early convert to Christianity from Duff's school in Calcutta, later Free Church minister and missionary in Bengal, Singh was in Britain to attend the 1860 Liverpool Missionary Conference, a precursor of Edinburgh 1910*). Mr Rose

remarked to 'express the hope that while as a Society we were engaged with Home Mission work some might be found ready at close of their studies in the Hall to devote themselves to missionary work abroad.'

26/01/61 – Rev JG Clarke, formerly minister of Free Church Bombay addressed the meeting on missions in India, supporting general education as a basis for mission 'in connection with the teaching of Scriptural truth', and 'he urged the students in looking forward to the ministry to hold themselves in readiness to go to India or elsewhere at the call of their Saviour and Lord'.

Business relating **to the Calton Mission**, connections with local church Free St James. Clear, regular social connections with the UP Missionary Society, 'United Presbyterian Theological Hall Missionary Society'. Liaising with 'Edinburgh New College Missionary Society'.

Feb 1862 – sending funds to Geneva and India. 'Missionary library' to be formed for students at Glasgow.

PRINTED REPORT 'For the year ending 1st November 1862'.

Annual report – connection terminated with the Calton. Due to distance from the residences of the students, now going to be in Burnside Street, with Dr Buchanan –

prayer meetings and household visitation. Two meetings every Sunday evening, one on each side of Burnside St, and a third during the week. No pecuniary obligations for this (unlike Calton) therefore 'it resolved to collect funds for some foreign object' one for Evangelical Society of Geneva, other for India. Will collect from individuals and congregations.

7/3/63 – address by Rev Carstairs Douglas from China and Mr Hastie of Pretoria

27/2/64 – addressed by Rev Irving of Falkirk 'urging upon the students the claims of the Colonial field' and proposing that they support a missionary in India for £60, Mr Baku Pudmonyi. Society then adopted him 'as their missionary in India', and contribute '£30 or as much as possible' (Irving said he could raise £30) (BP sends letters)

18/3/64 - addressed on Jewish missions

12/64 - transfer of mission district to South Woodside

25/2/65 – discussing Dr Duff's proposed scheme of congregational visitation, to diffuse information about the missionary operations of the Church, liaising with Foreign Missions Committee, agreed – students to address congregations on foreign missions, to 'awaken interest' and 'invite the people to increased liberality', which they did

18/11/65 – letter from Convenor from Presbyterian Church of England seeking three missionaries – one for Rajshai, Bengal as minister of a Scotch congregation and to work with Singh, one 'to assist Mr Maxwell in organising the first Protestant Mission in the island of Formosa' and one for China.

2/12/65 – address from Rev James McNair, newly appointed missionary to New Hebrides with the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Nova Scotia

1866 – Addressed by ministers from Spain and Bordeaux

1866 – GU Society and Glasgow University Prayer Meeting Association request to send deputation – refused 15 to 3.

Jan 1867 – Rev James Cameron of New South Wales

NOTES OF PARTICULAR INTEREST

9/11/67 – Duff becomes Honorary President, letter from Duff 27/11/67 to Society from Foreign Missions Committee on suggestion that they pay the £30 a year to Baku Pudmonyi – agreed, recommends another in India to consider – the 'Indapur and Jantra Rural Mission', a 'native agency' which they agree to (an Indian running it – illegible)

Early 68 – letters from BP, work amongst young men in Bombay – filling the place of Rev Gardiner in Puna. Letter Rev J McNair of Eroumanga appealing for more people.

08/02/68 – Duff addresses the meeting about the Indapur mission which they will be supporting, then spoke on Indian missions generally. Question raised on secular character of education system. Duff – 'the necessity of joining secular instruction with evangelistic efforts', which he said FC had done successfully.

The following sets the SVM in context, both in North America and in the UK. Harder (2011):

"The primary impact of the SVM was that it served as a mission recruiting agency among university students. The early, rather spectacular results gave the movement a charisma, a sense of destiny. Results were particularly noteworthy in the North American movement. By the time of the SVM First International Convention in 1891, the number of volunteers stood at 6,200 with 321 already having sailed for the field (Mott 1946, vol. 1:31ff). In 1902 at the Fourth International Convention in Toronto, 1,953 volunteers had sailed under 50 different missionary societies (Mott, 1946, vol. 1:79). By 1910, and the Edinburgh Conference, 4,346 volunteers had sailed. Of these, 1,253 went to China, 840 to India, Burma, and Ceylon, 466 to Africa, 374 to Japan and 266 to South America (p. 122). The SVM reached its apex in 1920 when 20,000 students by then had been recruited for missionary work. After 1920, however, recruitment dropped sharply and the SVM movement generally suffered a decline. But by 1920, the number of volunteers who had sailed from North America stood at 8,140 (p. 175). In total, the North American Branch produced some 13,000 foreign missionaries (Beahm, 1941, p. 234).

The initial results in Britain were not quite as dramatic. At the International Students' Missionary Conference in Liverpool in 1896, it was reported that since the founding of the SVMU in 1892, a total of 212 volunteers had sailed under 42 missionary societies to 27 countries. By 1900, and the London Conference in 1900, 1,686 had volunteered, out of which 565 had sailed. By 1909, 3,360 had volunteered and 1,400 had sailed. By 1933, fully 3,489 had sailed, with a total of 7,102 volunteers."



Also known as College Missionary Society. A hall at 10 Possil Road, Garscube was rented from James Allan & Son, Elmbank Foundry, next door, c.1880.

Subscribers, collectors amongst the students, two for each class – Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Logic, Greek, Latin –there were 'four divisions of the hall'.

20/2/22 – 'to be earnest in prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit without whose blessed aid all human effort to extend the boundaries of the Redeemer's Kingdom must be unavailing.'

First meeting 19/12/1821 at Glasgow College, then they meet in the Library of the Divinity Hall

Early on reading papers e.g. conversion of the Jews. A lot of discussion about the 'gown students'.

Early on, they are collecting money for other mission societies e.g. Accounts for 1823 they have subscriptions coming in (about £38) and they send money to: Scottish Missionary Society, Glasgow Missionary Society, Baptist Missionary Society for Translations, Moravian Missionary Society for its South African Mission, London Hibernian Society (and 1, 2 and 5 in succeeding years)

19/4/23 – they discuss having a regular publication on the subject of missions 'for the diffusion of missionary zeal, especially among students of theology' (decide against)

17/1/24 – looking towards an annual correspondence with similar associations in other Scottish Universities, and with missionaries and missionary colleges – Aberdeen, Edinburgh, with North America and the East Indies, and with 'Mr Thomson missionary in 'Cafraria'

17/12/28 – great demand for the annual reports, 300 to be printed and distributed, 'the whole University had now become the sphere of the Society's operations'

16/12/29 - 'the peculiar prosperity of the Society last session'

Jan 1830 – discussing Edward Irving's plan and intending to debate the home department of foreign missions

1830 – now also supporting e.g. at home Highland Missionary Society, Glasgow City Mission, and abroad Mission to the Jews, London Missionary Society, and by 1832 the Serampore Mission, India

1835 eg discussing the history of missions

16/2/35 – **'a very interesting communication from A. Duff, Missionary at Calcutta'**, expressing wishes for the success of the Association and a gift

1835 - circular to students on the Society

In correspondence with Edinburgh, Aberdeen and Belfast, read papers to each other, no outside speakers as yet

By 1837, contributing to 'General Assembly's Indian Mission' and 'Glasgow Colonial Society' and 'Evangelical Society of Geneva' as well as mission to the Jews, plus LMS, BMS, SMS

1838 - Islay Burns, later Professor at Trinity College is a member and secretary

3/1/39 – discussing 'the success of missions in India'

1839 – guest Rev Machar on the 'destitute spiritual condition of the multitudes in Canada nominally attached to the Church of Scotland' - proposing a College and CofS probationers be sent out as missionaries

Later discussing SMS and the West Indies, and letter from missionary in St Petersburg about mission in Siberia

Dec 30 1839 – 'that this meeting regard it as the highest privilege no less than the solemn duty of every Christian, to cooperate, according to the extent of his means and opportunities, in the great and glorious work of diffusing the knowledge of salvation throughout the world'.

17/12/41 – 'the duty of all Christians to aid the cause of missions and especially of students in a Christian University'

21/1/42 – an essay on the 'South Sea Missions', especially New Zealand

4/3/42 - an essay on the progress of Irish missions

(Seem to have little relationship to mission in Glasgow e.g. no mention of Thomas Chalmers and the Tron)

17/3/43 – a paper by a medical student on Chinese Medical Missions

27/3/43 – sending money direct to Dr Duff, now funding Glasgow Medical Missionary Society, Moravian Society etc, Professors talking of the 'great desire they had that their students should engage in missions'.

(Interesting to see the developing priorities, like Free College)

MS Gen 1434/2 - Minutes

Minute book, Glasgow University Missionary Association. Vol. 2: 22 November 1843 - 3 April 1866.

Dec 1843 – little mention of the Disruption, by now called 'The College Missionary Association', being at Glasgow College, other than 'regret' of effect on church at home and amongst missionaries abroad. **Mr Rainy is a member**.

By 1848, only eight members attending a meeting, it was postponed

1862, and again in 1864 – a missionary appointed for the east side of High Street, visit 15 hours per week, to hold an adult class and a meeting on the Sabbath, visitations, salary of £60, now not apparently contributing to foreign missions

Loose autograph letter, signed, from John Wilson, Secretary, to David Buchan Dowie [sic - i.e. Douie], Secretary to the Glasgow Theological Missionary Association, Garnet Hill, Glasgow. Mission House, 18 St John Street, Edinburgh, 28th Feb. 1826.

Welcoming Wilson's letter suggesting correspondence between Glasgow and Edinburgh Associations, and with students at Andover. Suggests also corresponding with Presbyterian students at Princeton. Edinburgh Association has about sixty student members, meeting monthly to read essays. About 100 books donated to its library.

MS Gen 1434/3 - Minutes

Minute book, Glasgow University Missionary Association. Vol. 3: 16 November 1866 - December 1870.

At this time, still mainly funding the local 'missionary' and not abroad, but then discussing 'the claims of the Chamba mission' on the society from a Rev Ferguson – say will try to send him some money. They disagree as to whether it should be for home mission only.

9/3/69 – they have 'cordial sympathy' to have Foreign Mission Schemes amongst the Scottish Universities and say they will cooperate with divinity students elsewhere to raise funds for missions of the Church of Scotland. The Missionary Associations of the four Universities met and agreed to form a 'joint organisation for the support of some special foreign mission', advised by the Foreign Mission Committee of the CofS, 12 students of divinity to manage this Society appears to have discontinued after meeting in Dec 1870 for reasons unspecified.

MS Gen 1434/4 - Minute book

Minute book of Glasgow University Missionary Association. 15 March 1872 - 14 March 1890.

Meeting 15/3/72 amongst students and above formed.

New Constitution (having consulted other associations);

"II Object – That the object of the Association shall be to promote the spread of the Gospel at home and abroad, and more especially to excite interest and cooperation in missionary work amongst the students of the University'.

19/3/72 – they had spoken to MacLeod of the Barony who talked of 'the lack of interest in Foreign Missions manifested by the Church' and offered to speak to the Assoc.

3/4/72 – will split income between home mission and India. Motto adopted – 'the harvest truly is great'.

Hon Pres is Dr Caird, address 8/1/72, India as 'most important to us of all foreign missions' plus mission at home

18/1/73 – addressed by a theologian from New Orleans, talking of missions to 'millions of emancipated slaves'

1873 – they look to appoint a home missionary in Newhall, and students begin work there, later in 1875 they move their work to Anderston and look to purchase a building

1874 – they contact the CofS India Mission Committee and the Royal Infirmary

25/3/75 – addressed by Mr Maclagan, Secy of the CofS Foreign Mission, who talked on the 'projected African mission', and India, number of converts 'comparatively small', but influence is 'enormous' as 'the whole fabric of heathenism is shaken to its foundation'.

They start giving money abroad e.g. £40 for a printing press at Livingstonia on 13/3/76, Syrian Protestant College at 'Beyrout', mission at Darjeeling etc

12/12/77 – going to contact Mr Babha, a Parsee student from Bombay at the FC College, to address them on mission in India, did so on 12/1/78

They appear to begin around 1879/80 the same 'pleading' rounds as the FC College of going out to make direct appeals to churches, and not just subscriptions from students

14/11/81 – CofS recommend that they support a native catechist at Duska in the Punjab, Nathu Mal, at 30 rupees (£3) per annum – they agree to do so from 1/1/82

9/3/83 – four University societies to combine to support a mission in India?

By this time, they are supporting Anderston, the native catechist and 'Manbhum mission in Bengal'

They decide to move their mission to Partick as large number of RCs in Anderston and the five churches there are all far from full 1884 – instead of Royal Infirmary, they write to Western Infirmary to visit the wards there (latter refuses, so they will go to former on Sundays)

SIGNIFICANT TO FOLLOW!

20/12/84 (letter George Anderson from Galashiels)– the four Universities at Edinburgh meeting of the Central Committee of the Universities' Mission had agreed to adopt the district of the Santal Parganas as the sphere of the new mission, instead of Manbhum. Mr McFarlane, late of the Darjeeling Mission, to be the new missionary in the new mission station. A sub-committee of the FMC of the CofS to manage the affairs of the new mission, with equal numbers of FMC and reps of the four universities (12 each), although ultimately the FMC accept 'full responsibility in regard to providing for the missionary'

Feb 1885 – they begin mission with Kelvinside church – visitations and holding meetings

18/12/85 – AGM – Mr Macfarlane engaged, but still looking for suitable sphere. 138 churches had been visited for 'pleading' in the summer, receiving £347. Mr Reid visiting in Kelvinside district and Mr Muir to the Infirmary wards

30/3/86 – Mr Macfarlane recommends 'Independent Sikhim' – agreed he should work there, and during the rainy season assist in a proposed institution to train native catechists to supply Sikhim, Darjeeling and Kalimpong

Their income is £564 per annum – Home Mission £191 (incl missionary;s salary of \pm 90), £36 to native catechist, £250 to Scottish Universities Mission.

DRAFT CONSTITUTION, as revised by SUB-COMMITTER, and submitted to GENERAL COMMITTER, 12th November 1888,

- I. NAME.—This Society shall be called the "Glasgow University Missionary Society."
- II. OBJECTS.—The objects of the Society shall be to cultivate a Missionary spirit among the Students of the University, to promote the spread of the Gospel both at home and abroad, and to be a centre of practical Christian work for Students of the University.
- III. MEMBERSHIP.—(1) Ordinary.—The Ordinary Membership shall consist of Matriculated Students of the University who have enrolled their names in the Album of the Society. (2) Honorary.—A list of Honorary Members shall be kept, and Honorary Members shall be those who have acted as Honorary and Ordinary Presidents of the Society, and others whose names have been submitted for approval at a General Meeting of the Society.
- IV. OFFICE-BEARERS.—The following Office-Bearers shall be elected annually :—Honorary President, President, Vice-President, a Senior and a Junior Superintendent of Home Missions, a Senior and a Junior Secretary, a Senior and a Junior Treasurer, Librarian, and twelve others (of whom six shall be elected from the Faculty of Theology, three from the Faculty of Arts, one from the Faculty of Law, and two from the Faculty of Medicine). These shall form the Committee of Management.

Ner:

- V. FUNDS.—(1) Funds shall be raised by Members' Subscriptions, Collections in Churches, Donations from those friendly to the Society, and by other suitable means. (2) The Committee shall have power at any meeting to authorise the payment of any sums in discharge of current expenses; and the Treasurer shall only make such payments with the previous sanction of the Committee. Disbursements in discharge of the Society's Foreign Mission Schemes shall only be made by the Treasurer with the previous sanction of a Statutory General Meeting.
- VI. BYE-LAWS.—I. Committee Meetings shall be held only after twenty-four hours' notice from the Secretary ; five Members shall form a quorum.

2. An Ordinary Meeting of the Society shall be held every fortnight during the Winter Session. Two at least of these shall be Statutory General Meetings, one being held before Christmas, and one in March. The Notices calling these Meetings shall be printed and posted up in both Quadrangles at least three clear days before the date of Meeting.

Ma at the second an Annual Report and Financial Statement shall be submitted, a Missionary Scheme adopted, and the Honorary President and Committee of Management for the ensuing year appointed.

4. All Meetings shall be opened and closed with w

5. No motion affecting the Constitution of the Society shall be discussed unless notice of said motion has been given at a previous Ordinary Meeting. By 1890, they are not fulfilling their obligation to give £300 to Sikkim, being asked to fund an additional European Teacher

The Directors of the GLASGOW MISSIONARY SOCIETY in looking over the list of the Societies and Associations, from whom they have at different times received assistance, are sorry to find that not a few have ceased to contribute to their funds, and, therefore, with the view of promoting a kindly feeling between them and those Associations, which are so necessary for the support of every Missionary Institution, they have resolved to send a general circular, both to those who still continue to contribute to them, and also to those who have withdrawn their aid, thanking the one for their continued assistance, and entreating the other again to remember the Glasgow Missionary Society at the annual distribution of their funds. The Glasgow Missionary Society has, at the present period, in its employ, amongst the inhabitants of Caffraria, South Africa, four Missionaries, two Missionary Artizans, five Native Teachers, besides Interpreters and other assistants, who occupy four Stations, where Churches have been built, Schools opened, and in connexion with which, the Gospel is preached, the Sabbath sanctified, ordinances dispensed, children taught, and the work of conversion, under the enlightening and sanctifying influence of the Spirit, steadily going on. There are now a considerable number of native converts ; and the stated worshippers upon Sabbath at Chumie, which is the oldest Station, is usually about 150 or 200 individuals. According to the last letters from the Missionaries, matters wear an encouraging aspect. Three persons have lately been baptized at Lovedale, one at Burnshill, and three at Chumie. Several of the Chiefs have also of late been living at one of the Stations, and strong hopes are entertained that one of them at least, has so felt the power of the Gospel, upon his mind, that he will not again draw back to the world. The Schools are prospering, and the Missionaries, after having printed several useful lessons, hymns, and catechisms, for the instruction of the people, are now far advanced in the translation of the New Testament into the language of the natives. The Society have the prospect of sending out another Missionary during the present

year, and considering our diminished resources, we must look to those who usually give of

3. TRINITY COLLEGE LIBRARY UNCATALOGUED BOUND PAMPHLETS

Stewart Mechie in his centenary volume on Trinity College, as well as noting between 80,000 and 100,000 titles in the Library, wrote:

'Our great Pamphlet Collection numbers some 14,000 tracts and pamphlets, stretching over four centuries from the beginning of the seventeenth...so many of these bound volumes need re-binding.'⁷

According to Glasgow University Library in the present day, they are aware of a sizeable collection of printed pamphlets bound into volumes from the Trinity College Library, which they estimate to be around 80 volumes in total. Some have as little as 5 lengthier items, others up to 30 items. If the average is say 15 pamphlets in each, the Library is thus aware of around 1200 items. It is presently unknown where the remainder of the Pamphlet Collection might be.

A random sample has been taken to assess the possibility that some of them might have relevance to home and foreign missions. The sample that I have considered was of 18 volumes, thus just under one quarter of the total of which the Library is aware. Those volumes were, for the most part, from the mid to late 19th Century.

Many still have binding issues. The bound volumes are in no particular order. They have not been catalogued, nor is there a digital record. However, in many of the volumes (but not all), there are accompanying handwritten sheets setting out the title of each item that is within the volume on a proforma – they appear to have been written out in 1973-74 at the transfer of the Trinity College Library to the GUL on its closure.

In general, there is fascinating material here for any historian of the 19th Century Scottish Churches, and the Free Church in particular. In the sample of eighteen volumes, four of them were very strong on documents relating to the Disruption – mostly speeches, lectures, sermons and treatises by the main protagonists and lesser lights.

In addition, there is occasional material on Free Church mission which might be of particular interest to a missionary historian. The particular aspects that would relate to the study of the history of missions is limited in this sample, and is emboldened below.

The caveat is that it is not clear to me how accessible the material would be otherwise in other depositories in relation to both the Free Church, the Disruption and foreign missions e.g. at New College Library, Edinburgh. Nevertheless, given the extent of valuable material from a random sample of eighteen volumes, my recommendation is that funding should be sought to allow the full cataloguing, including digitally, of all of the eighty volumes that are known, and also to instigate a search within the Library's holdings to identify possible further volumes. The latter is necessary given the discrepancy between the figure quoted by Mechie in 1956 and the known extent of the holding now. Were the cataloguing and search to be carried out, it could potentially open up fertile fields of study for researchers in the above areas.

The following have been listed chronologically, although they were presented randomly for reading. Material which relates specifically to missions is emboldened:

1. 'TRINITY PAMPHLETS 1708'

A selection of bound printed pamphlets on various matters of church and doctrine from the very early 18th Century.

- A sermon preached by Henry Grey in 1818 in Lady Glenorchy's Chapel on the diffusion of **Christianity being dependant on the exertions of Christians**
- A Memorial Recommending The Establishment of Mission to the Roman Catholics in Ireland (1825)
- A sermon by Ralph Wardlaw on 'The Truth, Nature and Universality of the Gospel' before the Society of Stirlingshire and Vicinity in Aid of Missions and other Religious Objects (1819)
- A sermon by David Dickson on 'The Goodness of God in the Late Favourable Harvest' (1819)
- 4. 'PAMPHLETS'

Various from the 1830s, including the Baptist Magazine and a sermon preached by Thomas Chalmers on the death of Rev Dr Andrew Thomson (1831).

5. 'UNITED PRESBYTERIAN LIBRARY PAMPHLETS'

A selection of pamphlets from 1836 to 1840, mostly relating to the subject of religious revival, and of the voluntary principle for churches.

Also various confessions and creeds and papers arguing for amendments.

Of particular interest re missions is a full printed copy running to 178 pages of an address given Alexander Duff at the opening of the Free Church General Assembly of May 1873, entitled *The World Wide Crisis* giving a very full account of the theological principles of foreign mission and details of in every part of the globe.

Also of interest is a lengthy printed paper: *The College Question* by Rev Andrew Gray (James Dewar & Son, Perth, 1850) where, after considering the history of ministry training from Established Church, he sets out the debate as to whether there should be only one ministry training college for the Free Church (New College, founded 1846) or whether that should be expanded to three (also Glasgow and Aberdeen), arguing for the latter.

17. 'MISCELLANEOUS PAMPHLETS 4.'

Mostly 1870s, some relating to amelioration to conditions of the poor e.g. 'workmen's houses' and Edinburgh Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, and a report on the poor of Edinburgh from 1868.

18. 'PAMPHLETS GLASGOW AND OTHERS'

A wide selection of pamphlets from the 1880s with interesting material on Victorian Glasgow, such as the Kelvingrove Art Galleries and Victorian town planning, as well as religious texts, and material relating to the gold standard (!). Latterly, strong Free Church material, such as:

George MacLean was born c.1898 in Kilininian, Argyll & Bute, Scotland. He matriculated into the medical faculty at the University of Glasgow in 1910.

In his first year he studied Chemistry, Anatomy, Zoology, and Practical Zoology. His second year subjects were Anatomy and Physiology. In his third year he studied Practical Anatomy, Materia Medica, and Clinical Medicine. In his fourth year he studied

Pathology, Clinical Medicine, and Vaccination. In his final year he specialised in Surgery. He graduated MB ChB in 1915.

Administrative history

Herbert Watt Torrance was born in Tiberias in 1892, the third son of Dr David Watt Torrance, a missionary who had worked in Palestine, Egypt, Damascus, Nazareth and opened a hospital in Tiberias in 1885, with the specific purpose of being open to any race or religion. Herbert Watt Torrance studied at the University of Glasgow between 1911-1916, graduating with an MB ChB in 1916. During his time at University he received a medal for Surgery (1914-1915), first class certificates for Physics, Surgery, Clinical Surgery, Diseases of the Ear, Diseases of the Throat and Nose and Practical Pathology. He also received Second Class certificates in Zoology, Anatomy, Practical Botany, Systematic Botany, Pathology, Systematic Embryology, Clinical Medicine and Midwifery . He served in France and Serbia with the Royal Army Medical Corps and was awarded the military cross. After demobilisation he returned to the University of Glasgow as demonstrator and lecturer and to study for the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons. He was awarded an MD in 1921 and received a commendation for his thesis on Tay-Sachs' Disease. He returned to Tiberias and in 1923 became superintendent of the hospital. He was made an honorary Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons and was awarded an OBE for services rendered during the British Mandate in Palestine.

Following the declaration of the State of Israel in 1949 the hospital became a maternity hospital responsible for midwifery and gynaecology under the Israeil Department of

Health. The hopsital closed in 1959 and Herbert Watt Torrance returned to Scotland in 1961, working as a GP in Dundee. Herbert Watt Torrance married twice and had two daughters. He died in 1977. The work of the Torrance family for both Arabs and Jews is commemorated in Tiberias by Torrance Square which bears a dedication to Dr David and Herbert Torrance. Administrative history

Eliza Jane Miller was born in Glasgow on 31 January 1879. Her father, Alexander Miller, was a physician and surgeon. Eliza studied medicine at the University of

Glasgow from 1898-1903 and was awarded fifteen prizes in total, including medals for Physics in 1899; Anatomy (Senior), Practical Physiology and Practical Pharmacy in 1901, and Practice of Medicine in 1903. She graduated with an MB ChB in July 1903, and after completing her terms as House Surgeon at the Glasgow Royal Samaritan Hospital for Women and Glasgow Royal Maternity Hospital, she joined the United Free Church Mission in 1906 as a medical missionary in Newchwang, Manchuria, China. In 1910 she resigned from the mission and married fellow missionary Reverend Alexander Ramsay Mackenzie (MA 1903). She then accompanied her husband on postings to Liaoyang, Machuria, China (1910-1912); Kai Yuan, Manchuria, China (1912-1913); Yungling, Manchuria (1914-1920) and Shenking, China (1920-1928). In 1928, they returned to Scotland for a year while Reverend Mackenzie wrote his survey Church and Missions in Manchuria. After her husband's death in 1929, Eliza returned to China as an evangelical missionary and took up postings in Shenking, China (1929c1934) and Kai Yuan, Manchuria, China (c1934-1940). She retired in 1940, but her return to Scotland was delayed by the Second World War. Instead, she studied at the Canadian School of Missions, Toronto, Canada, from 1940-1943. Eliza died in Glasgow in 1977.

Administrative history

Helen Milne Lawson Muggoch was born in Kilmarnock in 1915. Helen attended the University of Glasgow from 1933-1937, taking classes in Botany, Chemistry and Natural Philosophy in her first year; Botany (Higher) and Zoology in her second; Zoology (Double) and Botany (3rd Year) in her third year and Botany (Honours) in her fourth and final year. She was awarded a certificate of merit for her work in the Zoology practical class in 1935. She graduated with a first class honours BSc in Botany in June 1937 and subsequently worked briefly as a teacher until she married James Cameron Purse Logan (MBChB 1938) in December 1939. She then accompanied Dr Logan to Africa where he worked as a medical missionary, initially with the Church of Scotland mission leprosy service and later with the Nigerian government's own leprosy scheme. On their return to Scotland in 1950, she became chairman of the Glasgow committee of LEPRA.

Administrative / Biographical History

Elizabeth Thomson was born on the 14 September 1847 in Glasgow, Scotland. Both her father and grandfather were students at the University of Glasgow. Her grandfather, Dr Thomas Thomson, was Regius Professor of Chemistry there from 1818-1852. Elizabeth was widely travelled and visited North America, India, Japan and most of Europe. She worked mostly as a teacher and missionary abroad in her capacity as a member of the Temperance movement. Latterly she was heavily involved in the Suffragette movement and was instrumental in the setting up of a branch of the Vigilance Association in Edinburgh in 1911. Her activities in relation to suffrage resulted in her imprisonment in May 1913 for 9 months following an alleged attempted arson attack at Jedburgh, Borders, Scotland, along with her sister and a teacher, Arabella Scott. Upon her release she resumed her travels abroad. She died in 1918.

Administrative history

Rev George Murray Davidson Short was born on 21 December 1890, the son of John Short, a watchmaker from Bartleholm, Beith, Ayrshire, Scotland. He was a student at the University of Glasgow from 1907-1912 and graduated MA in 1912 having studied Latin, Greek, Mathematics, English Literature, Logic, History, Moral Philosophy, Political Philosophy, Political Economy and Hebrew. During his studies he lived in Partick, Glasgow, and was, by 1916, a Church of Scotland minister. In 1924, he moved from Glasgow to work in Barrhead, Renfrewshire, Scotland. From 1925 he was a missionary minister in Kalcutta, India, and became Chaplain of the Indian Ecclesiastical Establishment. During his time there he was Secretary of the Bangalore Missionary Conference which invited Mahatma Gandhi (1869 - 1948), to address them. In 1927, while ministering at St Andrew's Church, Bangalore, India, Short had a private discussion with Gandhi in his home. In 1944, Short returned to Scotland to the parish of Largo, Fife. Short's ministry finally took him to Alloa, Clackmannanshire, Scotland, in 1954, where he lived until his death in 1978.

Administrative history

Thomas Ralph Morton was born in Greenock, Renfrewshire on 18 August 1900. His father, Robert Morton, was an electrical engineer. Prior to attending university, Thomas was a student at Greenock Academy. Thomas attended the University of Glasgow from 1917-1921, taking classes in Latin, French and History in his first year; English and Mathematics in his second, and English (Higher), Moral Philosophy and British History in his third year. He was awarded a certificate of distinction for his examination result in Latin in 1918 and a first class certificate in English in 1919. He graduated with an MA in June 1920, but returned the following year to take classes in English (Honours) and Scots History and Literature (Honours). He then studied theology at the Glasgow College of the United Free Church of Scotland, Glasgow, from 1922-1925, and was subsequently invited to become a Presbyterian Church of Ireland missionary in Manchuria, China, from 1925-1937. On his return, he worked briefly as a Presbyterian minister in Cambridge before becoming involved with the lona

Community, firstly as warden of the Iona Community House in Glasgow (1943-1950) and later as deputy leader of the community (1950-1967). In 1963, Thomas was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by the University of Glasgow. He died in 1977.

James Muir Grieve was born in c1866 in Millport, Bute. His father, Robert, was a surgeon. James graduated from the University of Glasgow with an MA in 1889. He studied Latin and Mathematics in his first year (1884-1885) and Natural Philosophy and Greek in his second year (1885-1886). In his third year (1886-1887) he took Greek and Logic, and in his final year (1887-1888) he studied Moral Philosphy and English Literature. His two brothers also attended the University of Glasgow. In 1884-1885 his brother John studied Logic and his brother, Robert Grieve (MB CH) graduated with an MA in 1889. After graduating James Muir Grieve moved to Langside, Glasgow. He received a Master of Surgery from Anderson College, Glasgow in 1895. In c1906 he moved to Queenstown, Cape Colony, South Africa where he became a private practitioner. He and his wife were medical missionaries in China and had three sons, all of whom became doctors. His son James Muir Grieve was born in 1901. Also a graduate of the University of Glasgow, he went on to study radiography and became the head of radiography at Groote Schuur in 1956 (working with Nobel Prize winner Allan MacLeod Cormack). He was appointed Associated Professor of Radiography at Groote Schuur by the University of Cape Town in 1989. The other two sons moved to Pietermaritzberg and Port Elizabeth. According to the University Council Registers James Muir Grieve died around 1949.
